INTRODUCTION

1978-79 was a year of celebration for the Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute marking the completion of ten years of work and effort on behalf of improved understanding of India in Canada and Canada in India. Indian dance and instrumental recitals, book displays and a major exhibition of Mogul and Rajput painting at the Royal Ontario Museum have allowed thousands of Canadians to learn more about the Institute and about India. We are delighted that so many were able to attend our birthday party and the occasion has filled us with optimism and renewed enthusiasm for the coming years. We are conscious that the Institute's mission in regard to Indian/Canadian relations has never been more important in this increasingly inter-dependent world. We are most grateful that this is a view which appears to be shared by the Governments of both countries. In India, our programmes continue to be viewed with respect and approval by the Ministry of Education and Social Welfare. In Canada, the Department of External Affairs has given our work increased attention and has endorsed the direction of our planning -- in particular in the area of Canadian studios. Clearly, financial constraints are making our work more difficult but we believe that we are making the most of our opportunities and shall continue to do so in the coming years.

PROGRAMMES

1. Fellowship Programme

Ten scholars received research grants in the 1979-86 competition. Four of these grants went to senior scholars, and five to junior scholars completing their doctoral studies. The sixth junior fellowship was granted in the performing arts category. The interests of these Fellows range from 8th century Indian Buddhism and Temple Architecture to the Canadian Image in India today.

In addition, two grants were awarded for Oriya and Tamil language study.

These 1979-80 grantees bring to 123 the number of Canadians who have received Institute support for research, language and performing arts training in India. Their affiliation

with Indian universities, libraries, numeums, and other cultural institutions has facilitated their individual studies. Such contacts have also introduced Canada to hundreds of Indians who knew little or nothing about us. The improvement in cultural understanding between Indians and Canadians is served both by the scholarship of our grantees and the personal contacts and associations they make while pursuing their studies. The list of Fellows for 1979-86 with their research and study topics is given in Appendix III. Because of funding limitations it has not been possible to offer swards to any of the alternate scholars.

Shastri sponsored research has resulted in the publication of numerous books, articles, conference papers, and multi-media materials. Each year a list of recent publications is attached to the Annual Report (Appendix III). Puller information may be obtained by requesting a copy of the 'Report of the Activities of Past Shastri Scholars' from the Head Office in Montreal.

2. Language Programme

The two training grants awarded for 1979-60 support the study of languages that are not taught in a Canadian university programme. The institute grant is, therefore, especially significant for students who require each preparation for future research. In 1988 the University of Calgary, with Institute support, will offer intensive Tamil language instruction as part of the Calgary/Shastri Summer Programme in Indian Studies. The current grants bring to twenty-two the number of Canadian scholars who have had the opportunity to improve their competence in an Indian language with the support of a Shastri language training grant.

1. Summer Programmes

In 1979, the Shastri Summer Programme in Canada was reintroduced. The Institute had begun this intensive Indian studies opportunity in 1972 at the University of British Columbia. Embsequently, 40-50 university students and high school teachers gathered each year on a Canadian university campus to participate in courses in Indian Civilization and languages, as well as cultural events generally organised by the local Indian community. In 1976 this Programme was cancelled because of inadequate funding.

The renewed Summer Programme will be supported by major commitments from the host university. The Institute's commitment will concentrate in the area of student bursary support and cultural activities. In 1979 McGill University will host the Programme, and offer courses in Indian Civilization, Hindi, music and dance.

The Institute and the University of Calgary have agreed to the presentation of the Shastri in-Canada Summer Programme at Calgary in 1990. In addition to a general Indian Civilization course, participants will have the opportunity to concentrate on the history and culture of South India. Tamil language instruction will be available. The Calgary Programms will also include a distinctive teachers' option for elementary and high school teachers who wish to introduce some aspect of Indian studies into their curricula.

The 1979 in-India Summer Programme will include eighteen participants. As in the past, the Programme will combine extensive travel with seminars and other educational opportunities. The academic programme is closely integrated with the travel in order to study various aspects of Indian culture and contemporary development at the most appropriate sites. The list of 1979 Summer Programme participants is given in Appendix VI.

In 1979 The Shastri Institute Inaugurated a distinctive Summer Teachers' Programme in India. This Programme has been organized on an experimental basis in association with the Ontario Federation of Teachers. Fifteen teachers will travel to India for a five week study tour designed to meet the special needs and interests of high school and elementary school teachers. The Institute has designed the Programme jointly with representatives of the Federation and the Programme will be led by an Institute appointee. Individual participants have paid virtually all of the costs of the Programme. It is hoped that the success of this new venture will lead to similar associations in other Provinces as well as continuing activity in Ontario. The list of participants in the Teachers' Programme is given in Appendix VI.

4. Visiting Recturer Programme

1978-79 was a particularly active year for this
Programme. Beven Indian scholars visited Canada and lectured at
Ebastri number universities across the country. The names of
the visiting lecturers are given in Appendix VII.

5. Canadian Studies Programms

In 1979 the Indian University Grants Commission formally recommended this Programme to the Covernment of India and the Programme has been approved. The Institute had begun its activities in this regard last summer with the visit of Professor Ian Drummond to India. Professor Drummond lectured on various aspects of the Canadian economy and Canadian economic history. The first Indian visitor to Canada under this Programme will come in 1979-85. The Institute's Canadian Studies activity has taken some time to develop. We believe it will become a major and important aspect of our general programme in the future as it provides the basis for a complementary sharing of opportunities for both Indian and Canadian scholars. Clearly the Institute's mandate cannot be well served until Indian scholars have the opportunity to pursue research in Canadian sources. The improvement in knowledge of Canada in India, and the development of Canadian Studies courses in Indian universities will depend in part on the success of this Programso.

6. Library Programme

The Indian studies collections of Shastri member institutions continue to grow with Institute support.

Approximately 200,000 volumes have been sent to Canada from India. In addition to the research and teaching support collections now boused in twelve universities and the National Library, some universities have used part of their Library Programme funds to provide classroom materials for primary and secondary school classes. The National Library of Canada has allocated Shastri funds for the purchase of books for their Multilingual Biblioservice. This service distributes books in some twenty languages to public libraries throughout Canada. Over 1,000 volumes in Hindi, Punjabi, and Urdu have been purchased by the National Library under this programme. It is anticipated that

approximately 1,500 titles will be distributed annually when the service is in full operation.

In 1979, Mr. Andre Preibish, a senior officer of the National Library, became Chairman of the Library Committee, succeeding Mr. Nicholas Cmelusik, of the University of British Columbia. The Institute is most grateful to Mr. Cmelusik for his three years service in this office, and especially for his leadership role in the development of policy for the Microfilm Programme.

In 1979 the Library Committee has been surveying South Asian, and particularly Indian, collections of the member libraries and will attempt to locate any other collections in this field in Canada. Mr. Preibish was entrusted with the task of data gathering and the edited data should be published in the Pall. In addition, the Institute will attempt to secure information in regard to use patterns of the Shaetri collections in member institutions.

The Institute has revised its policy regarding future microfilming priorities, and has developed new forms for film requests. Details regarding the Microfilm Programme may be obtained from the Head Office in Montreal.

Conclusion

It has been my great privilege to serve as President of the Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute for the last three years. There are many people to thank for the successes we have achieved, for understanding when we have failed, and in general for the joy of shared work and commitment. My colleagues on the Executive Committee, Harold Coward, Ian Kerr, and Joseph Richardson, have shared the burdens with enthusiasm. Since decision making in the Institute is a corporate activity, they share full responsibility for any successes. I reserve, however, all failures for myself.

The members of the Canadian Advisory Council continue to give their time and support to the Institute and its Programmes. In 1979 the Rt. Hon. Boland Michener retired as Chairman of the Council. He will continue as a member and also as Honorary President of the Institute. He was succeeded as Chairman by Mr. John Maybee, a former Canadian High Commissionse

in India. The Institute Is aspecially fortunate in this appointment and we look forward to many years of fruitful activity under Mr. Mayboo's loadership.

In India Professor William Corment continued the tradition of expanding the Institute's contacts while maintaining a smoothly efficient administration. Professor and Mrs. Carment have become especially well known for their hospitality to Indiana and Canadians. The institute has been enriched during their year in India.

The Delhi Office staff, under the leadership of Mr.

P. M. Malik, has provided another year of loyal and expert
service. We have extraordinarily little turnover in the
Institute's staff, which we believe reflects a sense of mutual
interest and support between the Canadian and Indian participants
in the Shastri organization.

In our Montreal Office Mrs. Mildred McKinnon and Mrs. Linds Fishman continue to provide excellent secretarial support which reflects a personal interest, and commitment to the Institute. They have worked effectively in difficult directively where shaentee officers must do much of the Institute's business by smil and telephone.

One of the chief structions of the Presidency of the Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute is the opportunity to work with Ray de la Ronde. The respect and effection which I hold for her is, I know, a reflection of the views of all of my colleagues on the Board, and of the ever increasing number of Canadians and Indians who become associated in some way with the Institute.

Pinally, I congratulate Professor William Carment, the new President of the Institute, and welcome him to this privileged opportunity to serve the interests of Indian studies in Canada and improve knowledge and understanding among our two peoples.

APPENDIX-V

LIBRARY PROGRAMME

The new Chairman of the Library Committee took up his appointment as of January 1979, therefore, the report on the activities Juring the past year is somewhat sketchy.

The following new developments took place:

- 1) The National Library approached the Board of Directors with a suggestion that part of the allocated funds be used for purphase of the appropriate type of books for the Multilingual Hibliosovvice. This service distributes books in some twenty languages to public libraries throughout the country to provide the reading materials to ethnic communities. The National Diprary earmarked Rs. 25,000 from its allocation for this purpose. The survey of potential users conducted by the Multilingual service indicated that books in Hindi, Punjabi and Gujarati are in the greatest demand, therefore, the Delhi office has been solecting more popular titles in adult and juvenile literature in these languages. At the time of writing, 362 volumes have reached the Multilingual Bibliosarvice and many more (approximately 800) are on the way. The selection is on the whole good, and physical quality satisfactory. Thus, through the Initiative of the Metional Library the books with Shastri Institute label will be distributed to a wide spectrum of the Indian community in Canada. It is anticipated that approximately 1,500 titles will be distributed annually.
- 2) The Library Committee decided during its annual meeting on September 21st, 1978 to survey the South Asian and particularly Indian collections of the member libraries as wall as to attempt to locate any other collections in this field in Canada.

The Chairman was entrusted with the task of data gathering. Short questionnaire accompanied by a brochure containing an extract from the library of Congress classification pertaining to South Asia was distributed to the member libraries. Since the deadline for returning of the questionnaire was April 15, 1979 all but three have been received on time. The

edited data should be published in a form of a report describing the state of the collections for South Asian Studies in Canadian Libraries.

During the year under review, a part of microfilmed Jayakar Papers was deposited in the National Library. The bibliography and description of this portion of the microfilmed collection is still awaited.

The statistical data for the past year are given below.

In its tenth year of existence the institute within the framework of the Library Programme distributed 25,455 books.

Since its inception this Programme brought to the participating institutions some 217,214 books as well as two sets of the official publications of the Indian Pederal Government and also selected ones from various states.
